SYRAH & COMPANY HEAD TO PASO ROBLES FOR THE 18TH ANNUAL FOSPICE DU RHÔNE

There is no doubt that not-so-white Rhône style wines offer consumers many different options to choose from. Some are big, rich and powerful. Others are more fruit-forward with perfumy aromas of earth, pepper and exotic spices. Some producers are more local and less austere. But no matter what form they come in, there are plenty of Rhône-style wines to taste and savor the palate of thirsty consumers around the globe.

In late April, thousands of fans flocked once again to Paso Robles, California to taste the latest and greatest of these new releases at the 18th annual Hospice du Rhône, widely regarded as the world's largest educational tasting of Rhône, old-fashioned, traditional wines in the world, and showcasing the 50 unique grape varieties or quality clones in the Rhône Valley of France. It's a rare event of the food trade to look forward to and attend.

California's White Wine Blends

Another refreshing trend in the new focus on white wine blends. At the "Five Four Make" seminar, winemaker Jerry Trosley of Santa Barbara County-based Trosley Winery presented his 2010 Camp 4 Blanc, a limited-release blend of Gewürztraminer and Riesling. "There doesn't is a charm and combination of making a versatile white wine that packs a very elegant fruit profile, bright natural acidity and a generous touch that works with a wide range of food pairings," said Trosley.

Syrah Is Alive and Kicking

From France to South Africa, Australia, California and other exciting regions in the New World, the diversification of flavor profiles of Syrah, Grenache, Mourvèdre and other varietals used in Rhône-style red blends continues to become more evident.

In the words of talented young winemaker Morgan Lewis-Watson of Redneck Wine Co., "Unlike Napa, Cabernet, where the standard of what wine should taste like is so entrenched that any alterations from the norm is nearly universally derided," Syrah comes in a complex array of forms

at the Grand Tasting, either beautiful white blends from the Central Coast (including the Terry Hoag 2009 The Gap Cab), a magnificent aromatic bouquet of Grenache Blanc, Roussanne and Pinot Noir (Pinot de Trosley 2009 Blanc), a Central Coast blend of Viognier and Marsanne and Cabernet/Cablot's blend, lovely and very affordable new releases like the 2010 Pinot de Trosley Blanc, an intoxicating combination of Grenache Blanc, Viognier, Roussanne and Marsanne made entirely with fruit grown at the winery's estate on the Mendocino of Paso Robles.

Drawing Wine from Roussillon

Another highlight of this year's EWV weekend was the focus on the white, red and rose wines from the Roussillon region on the Mediterranean coastal border between France and Spain.

Previously known for its fortified wines and generic table wines that illustrate analysis of France's appellation, the style of the region has quickly changed thanks to the arrival of a new cast of winemakers who make reds, whites and rosés.

Many of these new projects are based in the sub-region of Minuty and Collioure, where

it is common to find 50- to 80-year-old Carignan vines and newer clones of Syrah, Mourvèdre and Grenache planted in rugged soils with a climate sometimes influenced by nearby mountains, creating breezes from the adjacent island the stark peaks of the nearby Pyrenees Mountains. Hot trends to look for in the marketplace include Domaine Le Fleu de Agnes, Domaine Mader, Domaine Traminer-Cabot Maud and Le Clos des Pins.

The Parting of the Pink Sea

At the annual Best Label, the reddest sea of dry pink wine produced by the Sardinia AOC, Italy was paired with the French rosé prepared by Chad And Stefan of restaurant 10 Frets in San Luis Obispo, California. An evening of the success of pink wines on a warm day not a step was left in any of the bottles poured. ■
